A Message from Pastor Gary

"Long ago God spoke to our ancestors in many and various ways by the prophets, but in these last days he has spoken to us by a Son, whom he appointed heir of all things, through whom he also created the worlds. He is the reflection of God's glory and the exact imprint of God's very being, and he sustains all things by his powerful word." [Hebrews 1:1-3a]

The November 12, 2009 issue of The Chronicle of Philanthropy ran an article in its "Faces of Philanthropy" section called, "Handing Out Glimmers of Hope." The article speaks of Dr. Steven Isenberg, an oncologist in Indianapolis, who began an organization called "Medals4Mettle." The medals handed out to cancer patients come from people who have participated in amateur sporting events. The patients receive the medals with gratitude as symbols of their courage and determination to return to health.

The headline "Handing Out Glimmers of Hope" led me to think about our congregation. In a nutshell we are about those giving those glimmers of hope away to the greatest extent possible. Those glimmers of hope come through the many things we do: worship, prayer, Bible study, small groups, fellowship, food pantry, sponsoring our scout troop, hosting community events, and meeting people's needs to the best of our ability.

In that same issue of The Chronicle of Philanthropy was a small news release titled, "Church Donations Hold Steady." The article says that during this current recession 70% of congregations report that offerings for the first half of 2009 were the same or greater than offerings for the first half of 2008. That small article is a glimmer of hope for those of us whose job it is to meet the needs of our community with glimmers of hope.

Church Council Notes—November 10, 2009

Pastor Gary shared with the council members his purpose and activities in India during the October visit there. The meeting involved all the partners around the globe involved with the Arcot Church. With many members, each partner has a specific role and Gary was defining the role of the ELCA in this partnership. Specifically, the ELCA brings a fresh perspective in desiring to establish relationships rather than projects. Stressing the connection we all have through baptism, we share an identity—and this is what the ELCA desires to nurture. The concept was well received and Pastor felt good about the visit and the many meetings with congregations during the visit.

A letter from the Bishop's office shared with the Bethlehem members that their expected incomes were down about \$400,000 for this year. They are in the process of cutting programs. Mary Lasits moved that Bethlehem give the Thanksgiving and Christmas envelope gifts to the synod to assist with their shortfall. Motion passed. In the conversation that went along with this motion it was reported that Bethlehem is up-to-date with their pledges to the synod.

Property Committee: At their meeting, the group spent considerable time going over the expenses incurred during 2009 and analyzing whether savings could be achieved in any area. With committee persons willing to "do" projects rather than hire them out, the savings have been substantial. For an example, the project in the front area cost about \$80 for cement. The altar rail move cost about \$50. The next planned project will be the balcony space for the Bell Choir.

Social Ministry: During October, 607 households used the Food Pantry serving 1,896 persons. Sixty turkeys have been ordered for Thanksgiving costing \$15 each for a complete dinner.

Christian Education: The staff is happy with the new curriculum. Mary needs more teachers and will be approaching circles to help.

Finance Committee: Tammie introduced the proposed new format for budget reporting. The council approved the format and it will be introduced at the Annual Meeting, Part I, on December 13.

The next meeting will be held on December 16, 6:00 p.m.


Lutheran Church Women Project for all Church Members

Once again, the LCW will start collecting for LWR Health Kits. These kits are helpful for the people who must flee their homes quickly and often do not have time to pack essential items. Lutheran World Relief health kits can help children, men and women who are refugees maintain personal hygiene while living in exile. Items may also contribute to a new start for those who can return home.

Include the following items in each health kit:

- *One hand towel, dark color recommended,
- *one washcloth, dark color recommended,
- *one bath-size bar of soap, any brand, in its original wrapping,
- *one adult-size toothbrush in its original packaging,
- *one 5-7 oz squeeze tube of toothpaste with remaining shelf of at least 12 months,
- *one comb, wide-tooth preferred,
- *one metal nail file or nail clippers with file attached,
- *six Band-Aids (or similar brand), preferably 1/2-3/4" secured with rubber band.

Note from the Northern Illinois Food Bank

The following is excerpted from a letter we received from the Food Bank:

“ . . . In the past year the Northern Illinois Food Bank network has distributed 27,245,820 pounds of food to needy people and more than 50,000 different people benefited each week. The implementation of the Farm Bill, which included an increase in USDA commodities as well as an indexing for inflation, contributed greatly to amount of government food made available to our contracted Emergency Food Programs. Additionally, the unfortunate high rates of unemployment in a majority of our 13 counties resulted in an increased level of funding awarded to NIFB through county Emergency Food and Shelter Programs which was utilized for food purchasing. We will continue to pursue additionally sources of food and funds to keep up with the demand for assistance and stand ready to provide the support that is needed.

The Emergency Food Program is a federally funded program. The USDA commodities distributed to you as a “sub recipient” of the Northern Illinois Food Bank is considered to be a form of federal assistance. A dollar value is assigned to each commodity based on the cost to the government. Northern Illinois Food Bank is required to inform you of the value of federal assistance provided to you.

The food provided by the Emergency Food and Shelter Program (EFSP or FEMA) is also considered federal assistance and we are required to inform you of the dollar value. During the fiscal year July 1, 2008 to June 30, 2009 your emergency feeding program received from the Northern Illinois Food Bank:













EFP Pounds: 49,587.20
Estimated Federal Dollar Value: \$31,388.16

(Weight for November alone was 4,859.55 pounds)

TANF Pounds: 3122
Estimated Federal Dollar Value: \$1593.30

EFSP Pounds: 457
Estimated Federal Dollar Value: \$269.36

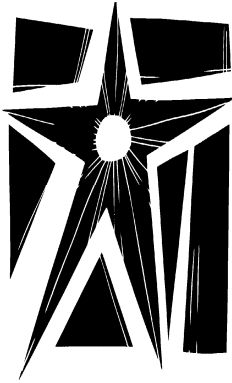
